### **Mildenhall Warren Lodge Final Report**

On Thursday 22nd May 2003, the 'official opening' celebrated the restoration of Mildenhall Warren Lodge and the creation of a circular walk, with interpretation, across the former warren. Media coverage surpassed expectations with articles in the Eastern Daily Press, Bury Free Press and the East Anglian Daily Times; interviews on Radio Norfolk and Radio Suffolk and a feature on BBC Television's 'Look East'.

Fund-raising for this project had begun in the autumn of 1999 and resulted in £5 000 from Forest Heath District Council; £21 700 from English Heritage and £22 500 from The Heritage Lottery Fund. The Forestry Commission, the landowner, made significant 'in-kind' contributions, including the creation of a car park, way-marking the new walk and giving expert advice at all stages of the project.

Members of Friends of Thetford Forest Park undertook conservation work around the lodge itself and along the walk and helped with deciding the route the walk should take. As the project progressed, special walks were held to show the public the developments. Mildenhall Museum has created a

display of artifacts from the site together with copies of original documents relating to the warren and has linked this display to the history of warrening in Breckland.

Following the tendering processes and the awarding of contracts, restoration work began in September 2003 under the guidance of Philip Orchard, architect, The Whitworth Co-Partnership, Bury St Edmunds. His knowledge of medieval building construction, attention to detail and quiet efficiency cannot be faulted. The builders, Butlers of Sawston, carried out the work with superb craftsmanship and expertise. Their skill, care and consistently high standard of work has delighted and impressed everyone.

During the restoration, monitoring and recording were carried out by Suffolk Archaeology Unit, Edward Martin providing valuable advice at the site meetings, and Planning Supervision was by P F B Construction Management Services Ltd of Norwich.

Suffolk Archaeological Unit were on site again to investigate the 'pile of rubble' adjacent to the east elevation of the lodge. Underneath the mound was the clunch wall of the nineteenth-century lean-to, the brick floor and traces of its use as a washhouse. Also discovered during the restoration were two wells and a possible cesspit or soakaway and these were made safe by Butlers as part of the additional work necessitated by the need to preserve the exposed section of walling.

The interpretation boards are based on the idea of 'The Warrener's World' and use the names of warreners known from documentary research. They are mounted on specially constructed mounds to complement the warren banks still remaining in the landscape. A leaflet has been produced by Forest Heath District Council describing the wildlife and the landscape features on the walk and is available at all visitor information outlets. Forest Heath District Council is including the lodge in the 'Discover Mildenhall' day it runs for schools and the walk is also being promoted in its 'Healthy Walks' leaflet.

The first public 'Open Day' on 26th May, a Bank Holiday, resulted in over seventy visitors, including two people who knew the lodge when it was still occupied as a home. Friends' has decided to hold an annual open day on this day in conjunction with the Suffolk Wildlife Trust whose Rex Grahame Orchid Reserve, on another part of the warren, also has its open day then.

Perhaps the project is best summarised in letters received after the official opening. Alan Johnson, English Heritage's Government Historic Buildings Advisory Architect, wrote of 'this very impressive partnership endeavour' and David Burnip, Chief Executive of Forest Heath District Council, described it as 'a shining example of partnership working.'

The event was opened by Carol Bundock from BBC Look East who played the damsel in distress, the perfect foil to the stars of the day, the dragon and an exuberant St George.

As a result £1020.02 was raised. This sum has been set aside to purchase new or adapt existing play equipment to make it accessible to young people who labour with a 'physical challenge' in their lives. ## **High Lodge Resource Building – An update by Anne Embry of the Forestry Commission**

The completion of Phase II of the High Lodge Forest Centre means that our restaurant has almost doubled in size, and we have gained the lovely new Bike Art retail wing. Unfortunately, during the construction we lost our old port-a-cabin classroom, which fell apart whilst trying to move it. Funding was sought to replace it immediately, and we are now pleased to announce that our new building is due to be completed by the end of August.

Built along the same lines as High Lodge itself, a green oak-framed construction similar to an old Suffolk barn, the new building is sited away from the Forest Centre among the lime trees at the far end of the field. Funding has been obtained from Suffolk County Council, Waste Recycling Environmental (WREN), and as part of Breckland's Objective 2 bid. Some of the building's green oak has come from Thetford Forest Park, and the pine for the flooring will also be from our own Forest.

Use of the building is planned to be exciting and varied. Of course, it will form the core of our extensive Ranger-led education programme – over 10,000 school children visit High Lodge every year. However, we are hoping to offer the new comprehensive IT facilities to post 16 learners, adult education providers from Norfolk and Suffolk, and a wide variety of life-long learning classes.

The resource building is also a useful platform for us to launch more intensely into the world of corporate events. With its own toilets, shower and small kitchen, the up to date conference and IT equipment make the building an unusual and unique venue for business meetings. Should groups wish to combine their business with a Go Ape trek, cycle ride or a three-course lunch, then they are all set for a corporate day with a difference! We are hoping that the building, once it is completed, will hold up to 30 people in a conference style set up, but unfortunately this could exclude us from offering larger groups the High Lodge experience. To alleviate this, an extension to the building is already being looked at, and we are pleased to announce that the 'Friends of Thetford Forest' have offered their help in this project.

The 'Friends' and Forest Enterprise will be working together on the funding for the extension, and we are currently investigating possible funding sources.
