## Friends Trip To Bedgebury Arboretum Saturday 12<sup>th</sup> April 2008

Friends' members have the wonderful opportunity of visiting Bedgebury Pinetum as guests of The Forestry Commission. Chris Reynolds, the Curator who gave us the brilliant talk at the AGM last October, has invited us and will personally show us round the site.

Bedgebury Pinetum, near Cranbrook in Kent, was established in 1923 and now forms the oldest and largest collection of temperate conifers anywhere in the world. The site is ideal, being a combination of marshy areas with drier ridges in a valley. At first, it was run jointly by the Royal Botanic Gardens at Kew and the Forestry Commission, but in 1965 the latter became sole owners.

In Spring, the Pinetum is exceptionally beautiful, with the vibrant colours of rhododendrons and azaleas reflected in the waters of the lake and the birdsong of the returning migrant birds.

The trip is open to all our members and there will be a charge of £12 per head to cover the hire cost of the coach and driver.

Food can either be taken with you, or bought at the facilities on site. We will be leaving at 08:00 from Santon Downham car-park, returning back there for 18:00.

There are limited places available, so please complete as soon as possible then return the slip on page 3 to the Treasurer at the address shown.

### Lynford Arboretum: Our first year

Late in February 2007, twenty-seven people attended the inaugural meeting of the Lynford Arboretum Group, of these half went on to become regular participants. From this small beginning the group has slowly grown in strength, now approaching the original figure and has contributed close to six hundred hours of effort.

Meeting initially one Sunday and, at the start, one Wednesday morning a month things have progressed to additional mid-week gatherings, sometimes followed by lunch in a local hostelry.

So what has been happening? At first, despite planning and careful direction from on high, things appeared somewhat confusing. The arboretum seemed enormous, but as time has passed its size appears to have diminished, but of course it hasn't. Initial efforts were concentrated on bring over-sized shrubs back into some sort of order especially where they impinged on hard pathways, this however is always dependant on the seasonal bird population and location.

Late summer in 2007 saw a concentrated effort on the clearance of what was to become the Hamamelis (Witch Hazel) Glade; after a number of weekend and midweek sessions the site was ready for planting. This task was successfully completed by Christmas leaving everyone thinking it would take time before there was anything to show for all the effort. Not so; one brave specimen proceeded to put on a splendid display of bright lemon yellow flowers, but little perfume. Others followed suit though in a more muted way, however they indicated what is to come.

Running parallel to all this physical activity has been much behind-the-scenes preparatory work concerned with planning, equipment, tools, health and safety, identifying training needs and general administration, all entailing numerous meetings.

And what of the coming year? Already thoughts are turning to next winter's planting programme, this time the subject will be Cornus (Dogwood) with the intention of bring more colour to the arboretum during the darker period of the year. Shrub pruning will continue according to the season and a start will be made on the restoration of the Salix (Willow) demonstration plot, also construction of sections of 'Wheat Fen' type walkways to the streamside path in an effort to reduce the 'poaching' of the path's surface.

With the foundation already in place, March will see the arrival of a portable building that is being manufactured in the North East of England; this is to be known as the "Friends Lodge". The Lodge will give the group a home from which to work, it will also allow for a diversification of activities; **Already planned are two short walks, both on Sunday mornings in May, as part of the Tree Council's 'Walk in the Woods' month. These take place on the 4th and 25th at 10.30, home in time for lunch so please join us, oh yes and they are free.**

Coming over the horizon are changes to everyone's train of thought in the shape of the Forestry Commission's 'National Arboreta Collection Policy', which is part of a much larger effort to combat climate change. The implications for the arboretum group are as yet, unclear.

Finally, my sincere thanks to all those who have given unstintingly of their time to the arboretum, for the support of the Friends Committee and to the FC's staff for their advice, help and forbearance.
